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President's Annual Report

The 2021/22 year has seen some major changes within the club.

Let us review the last twelve months.

- During 2021 National Events including the scheduled FCI shows, National Dog Show, NZDAC had to be cancelled.
- We needed to rely heavily on local judges to maintain a healthy show schedule that made us the envy of dog clubs around the world who suffered and still suffer lockdowns.
- The decline in membership has stabilised and we are now focused on automating membership renewals and introducing new member recruitment programmes.
- The balance sheet remains strong with nil debt and healthy cash reserves.



Financial 21/22 Results

Dogs NZ posted an operating profit (\$135k) before depreciation which resulted in a net profit of (\$54k) which was (\$215k) ahead of budget.

Before the impact of COVID we were facing a long-term scenario of static revenues and increasing costs. Our focus needs to be on driving registration and membership revenue as well as controlling event and governance costs.

The key is to use our strong balance sheet and healthy cash reserves to invest in growth.

Capex / Strategy Committees

Strategy Committee

Chaired by Martin Hewitt, the Strategy Sub committee's role has been to recommend a 5-10 year strategy to guide the annual business planning for Dogs NZ.

We have had a number of attempts in previous years to complete a long-term strategy for our organisation and it was important that the committee presented to EC and the membership a strategy for a future that is achievable and one which positions Dogs NZ as the premier national canine organisation in NZ. The document presented to last years ACOD will guide the future direction of DogsNZ.

Capex Committee

Capital Expenditure Committee chaired by Steve Tate made a number of long-term venue strategy recommendations to EC resulting in the sale of the Porirua property. The next job for the Capex Committee will be to find a suitable site in the Lower North Island to conduct our dog shows. Already DogsNZ has been approached by at least two local authorities to move to their areas. A presentation will be made at this year's ACOD by the Lower North Island Property Group on the progress to date.

Our Sponsor

Nestle Purina is our naming sponsorship and we are working closely with the Purina Pro Plan team to develop a number of programmes to support breeders, new puppy owners, canine training and the promotion of club shows. Covid has delayed the implementation of some of these but we look forward to rolling out these programmes in the next 12 months. I want to express my gratitude to the Purina Pro Plan team for their support.

Reputation & Relationships

Dogs NZ has continued to extend its contacts with outside organisations to strengthen our own organisation. Key initiatives in the past year include:

FCI

- Covid 19 has delayed our first FCI CACIB shows but we are delighted that during Easter 2022 the first was held in Christchurch with plans for a second and third in Auckland in early July.
- More NZ Judges have been added to the FCI Judges database.

Government

- We maintain a strong relationship with MPI/NAWAC. They are seeking our input into upcoming legislation such as Animals in Sports.

NGOs

- Rhea Hurley is our new Canine Health & Welfare Officer. A representative of NZVA-CAV committee sits on our Canine Health and Welfare Committee.
- We continue to work closely with the SPCA Inspectorate team and cooperated with them on a high-profile court case involving a Dogs NZ registered kennel name.

Canine Health & Welfare

- The development of a RFG scheme in conjunction with the University of Cambridge for breathing tolerance testing for Brachycephalic dogs was delayed by covid. But plans are underway to get the scheme up and running in NZ.

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- The Pugs became the first brachycephalic breed to adopt a LRL.
- Continued progress in assisting breeds to adopt LRLs: Bouviers; German Shepherds; Staffordshire Bull Terriers; Samoyeds, Dachshunds; Golden Retrievers and English Springer Spaniels.
- A health scheme to be used by judges in New Zealand similar to that in Scandinavian countries has been rolled out and data collected will be used for the benefit of our members.

National Office Staff

I want to thank all our staff who worked so hard through a difficult period. You are amazing.

Executive Council

I want to take this opportunity to thank Keith Brown who has served Dogs NZ with considerable skill and devotion and has decided to stand down from EC duties. Keith has served on EC for many years and his contribution has been enormous. Keith's passion has seen the Museum Trust grow both financially and within the show calendar. Keith has served as South Island Vice President and his dedication will be sorely missed around the board table.

And finally, I want to thank the Executive Council for their hard work under tiring conditions to keep our club a viable functioning entity.

More importantly I want to thank those many people outside of EC who have done so much for our club over the last year.

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Committee Reports

Agility

Is this the beginning of the end? Let's hope so. It's been nice being able to get to shows recently. I don't think the agility community realise how lucky we are being allowed to continue holding shows, albeit in a limited capacity. We would like to thank Dogs NZ for their support and decisions that have made this possible.

It's been a bit of a roller coaster keeping up with the ever-changing information around covid. The AC worked hard on coming up with ways that we could manage the vaccine mandates and be sure that attendees were following all government guidelines. When you have shows that are held in public places and you have no jurisdiction over the wider spaces, we had to work out a way that we could easily identify the vaccine verified show attendees from general members of the public and family members who weren't part of the event.

This is when Agility introduced the use of wristbands. Whilst it was an inconvenience for competitors and organisers, it made managing this a lot easier as you could tell at a glance who had been verified and who hadn't. We thank all our members who just got on with things and did what was needed to make things work.

The limit on attendees at shows was a definite challenge. There were a lot of members who felt excluded because they didn't fall within the maximum numbers. To this end clubs started to band together and form additional 'Red Light' champ shows in different areas on the same weekend holding the same events. As a result those who previously wouldn't have made it into a certain show had an identical show a bit closer that they could attend.

Thank you to all the clubs that worked together during these times to make this happen.

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This year we have done a lot of consultation with our membership to try and tackle some of the issues that have come up time and time again over the years. The issues haven't been addressed due to the 'bigger picture' nature of them. Changing one aspect has a much greater impact on other things. Instead of looking at these individually, we put them together and looked at them as a whole. This was to see how each bit affects the others, so that we could put together a well-formed plan for moving forward, and this has resulted in a restructure of our current awards and qualification system, which will be rolled out in the new year. We have made these changes as simple as possible while still achieving the end goal that the agility community have been asking for over the last couple of years. 🐾

The Breed Standards Committee considered a number matters by Email and Teleconference during the year.

Items considered and decisions made this year included:

- Chihuahua - Interbreeding of Coat Varieties to continue.
- German Wirehaired Pointer/Deutsch Drahthaar – Declined to recognise the Deutsch Drahthaar as a separate breed.
- Welsh Corgi – Declined a request to change the order of wording for the two varieties.
- Belgian Shepherd Dogs – Change to FCI Standard Approved.
- Miniature Pinscher – A request to make changes to the colours was declined.
- Great Dane – The exhibition of Merle Great Danes was declined. A change to the FCI Standard was also declined.

New Breeds Recognised during the year:

- Deutsch Langhaar (German long-haired Pointing Dog) – Gundog Group
- Wirehaired Slovakian Pointer – Gundog Group
- Murray River Retriever – Gundog Group
- Australasian Bosdog – Non-Sporting Group

There are several matters still under consideration.

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Purina Pro Plan Canine Good Citizen™

The Canine Good Citizen (CGC) programme was established approximately twenty-five years ago as part of Dogs NZ (then the New Zealand Kennel Club) endeavour to be recognized as a national authority regarding many matters concerning dog ownership, including, in this case, responsible dog ownership.

Such an ambitious programme has also been greatly enriched and enhanced by the very positive and generous ongoing support provided by Purina Pro Plan.

The CGC programme, is available for all dogs, whether pure or cross bred. From the outset has sought to provide dog owners, and members of the public, an assurance that their dog is likely to provide a favourable impression of what can be achieved when their dogs are well trained to deal with a range of distractions and environments.

Typical CGC training would include enabling dogs to be approached by friendly strangers (and even being petted); being able to walk beside a dog handler without having to be dragged along (or walking the owner by constantly pulling on the lead); walking through or past environments that might otherwise distract a dog sufficiently difficult to maintain control over. Walking past another dog for example or maybe even a cat or somebody with a mouth-watering hamburger.

Responsible dog ownership includes the ability to have a dog respond immediately to a range of commands, whether this be for safety or appropriate control reasons.

From my own involvement with the CGC programme as a participant and later CGC Assessor as well as CGC Committee member, I felt as though the NZ CGC programme had failed to keep up or adapt with changing societal mores and requirements. To this end, some initial "testing of the water" was undertaken with a significant response indicating that some changes were well overdue.

Regrettably suggestions of change for areas that had become steeply imbedded in tradition provoked considerable resistance. Change, where this has occurred over the past few months has therefore been painstakingly achieved, and I must thank the incredible efforts of the Dogs NZ CGC Committee for their tenacity. This is not to say however that all the CGC Committee agreed with all the proposed changes tabled. Their efforts to provide alternative viewpoints are to be duly acknowledged and respected.



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A first-time effort to also gain opinion from the general DogsNZ membership by way of encouraging them to submit comment on proposed changes was rather disappointing with silence being voluminous. However, the CGC Committee are indebted to the willingness of the Dogs NZ Executive Council to take the time to hear arguments from almost every corner. And accepting the need to allow for some change to occur to re-establish the Dogs NZ CGC programme as an appropriate responsible dog ownership programme relevant to today's society.

There is still considerable work yet to be done concerning CGC and, its administration. It is anticipated that the next twelve-month period is likely to be well marked with periods of intensity and contemplation.

I have been especially blessed with a current CGC Committee consisting of Brian Harris; Irma Harris; Lucy Sandford-Reed; Sue Howe; Merenia Donne and Crystal Currie, who have assisted me with this task. Sadly, over the preceding twelve months we did receive a resignation from Jan Dean who has been a part of the CGC Committee for many years. 🐾

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Scent Work

Phenomenal is the foremost word that springs to mind (along with extensive amounts of associated work).

Since its inception by Dogs NZ less than three short years ago (shortened even more considerably due to COVID-19 disruptions), Dogs NZ Scent Work has become an explosive phenomenon.

Given endorsement to evolve and advance as an autonomous discipline under the direct governance of the Dogs NZ Executive Council, Dogs NZ Scent Work has not only become Dogs NZ's fastest growth group but has also significantly added to its own national membership.

Qualifying Dogs NZ Scent Work Trials are now being conducted nationwide to such an extent that rarely would a month go by without at least two Scent Work Trials being hosted somewhere in New Zealand. These are currently being hosted by Dogs NZ Kennel Associations, Obedience Clubs and Scent Work Clubs. A week hardly goes by without an application from one Society or another to host a Qualifying Dogs NZ Scent Work Trial not being received.

Especially because it is autonomous from all other Dogs NZ Codes, Dogs NZ Scent Work has been able to appeal, and reach, over all current existent codes as well as those who are currently not involved in another code.

This is not to say that the Dogs NZ Scent Work Committee has a freedom to do as they wish. All Regulations and Rules of Conduct are still (appropriately) vetted and approved by the Dogs NZ Executive Council. In this respect, it would be remiss not to mention the especial assistance received from Jill Brooker who has held the position as EC Representative on the Dogs NZ Scent Work Committee.

Dogs NZ has also been exceptionally blessed with having had a very stable and committed Dogs NZ Scent Work Committee who are almost singularly responsible for all the administration associated with the management of Dogs NZ Scent Work.

Considerable work has been done to ensure the Dogs NZ Scent Work is not only well administered and professionally maintained, but also continues to be a credit to Dogs NZ who offered us the opportunity to exist.

A special thanks also goes to Sonja Needs who is not only a committee member, but also my counterpart with the Australian National Kennel Council. Her assistance has enabled a growth strategy that will hopefully eventually encompass the development of trans-Tasman Scent Work Trials.

Over the past twelve months, four additional Scent Work Classes have been added to the repertoire of Scent Work Trials with a further four



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being sought to be authorized this year. There are currently twenty Internationally recognized Classes. With the adoption of maintaining a gradual introduction of Classes, this has enabled all parties involved (especially Scent Work Judges and participants) to gain familiarity with all associated requirements and maintain a pace at which they feel they do not feel either rushed or having to wait too long to advance.

The Dogs NZ Scent Work Committee has also received a considerable number of compliments regarding the Dogs NZ Scent Work webpage which outlays much of the detail sought by interested parties. For this, we are indebted to Sue Conner for her considerable assistance. 🐾

We continue to be grateful to all the clubs who make time for the junior competition during their busy show day and to our judges who make time to learn and pass the JDH examination. Thank you also to our principal sponsor Purina Pro Plan, Supershots and all those who have donated prizes and assisted at ringside.

Junior Dog Handling

Lynley Bray and Helen Dupe coordinated a successful group of heats at Easter for the Junior Dog Handling competition. This ensured that the ASC crew could film each of the South Island heats for a children's television programme. The JDH competition also culminates in a national final in October. A catch-up Junior Dog Showing final for the 2020/2021 season was also held at CKA. Although there was no international final held for this period, the winners received a generous cash prize and product from Proplan. It is expected that the Crufts JDH competition will be held in 2023 and we will have our next NZ winner represent us at this prestigious event.

Auckland Property Management

Once again with the continued challenges of the Covid Pandemic the Auckland grounds has had another quiet year, with reduced bookings and income. This year we have taken on the challenge and made opportunities for ourselves. We have run show training Saturdays as well as having very successful ribbon parades. Sometimes it's the basics that get you through. We have also welcomed the NZ Police on board who are running ten-week training programs at the grounds. We hope to continue and expand on these programs to give us an extra revenue stream.



As with last year we have taken a very realistic approach to our maintenance requirements. Only the projects that are vital to our survival or those that create a safety issue are being attended to.

Our sewage project had long term delays due to boarder closures, but we are on the home straight with this now. Final testing and readings are underway, with council lodgement to be submitted shortly afterwards.

Our major project planned for the coming year, is to replace the light panels in the roof which have been in place since 1999. Once this is done, we should see a lot more light in the indoor area.

We have entered into consultation with our contractors to review arrangements that allow us more manoeuvring room should hard times hit again. The lawn mowing contract is a significant expense each year and with rising costs on fuel and labour this expense will only continue to grow. The committee has undertaken the challenge to reduce our annual cost and to be more efficient with this task, whilst still keeping the grounds looking beautiful. We are currently exploring the option of robotic lawnmowers. So be on the lookout for new members of our team soon.

The Auckland grounds continue to look fantastic and thrive due to the hard work and input from the awesome Auckland Grounds committee and their families. This is a dedicated group of volunteers that work hard to make the AEC the premier venue in New Zealand. I thank them for all of their efforts in this last year. 🐾

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Forrester Park Management

The 2021/22 financial year has seen the venue affected by Covid. A number of events have either been postponed or cancelled, including the Forrester Park Benefit Championship shows. This has had a detrimental effect on the revenue generated by the venue.



Despite this, the weekday usage of the venue by clubs undertaking both puppy show and dog training has continued. These are really valuable nights for both dogs and handlers. A number of clubs have held match shows and ribbon parades.

We have undertaken some well needed maintenance. This has included levelling off the floor in the building, fire door compliance, repairing leaks and changing to electronic door locks.

The relationship with the Dunedin City Council continues to be good. Dogs NZ lease the land on which the building sits. All other areas of the land are designated as a park under the DCC, which does mean there are restrictions on the usage of the park. The FPMC has a consent for 12 months to hold the events as per the set calendar. This is an improvement on having to apply for a consent for each event.

Going forward the building is showing its age (40 plus years old) with white rust affecting the corrugated iron that clads the roof and walls. This is materialising in leaks in the roof and will need ongoing repairs and ultimately replacement.

I would like to thank the hard working Committee both past and present and look forward to a year where more activity can happen at Forrester Park. 🐾

The Sale and Last Shows

The future of the Purina Pro Plan Wellington Exhibition Centre was decided at ACOD 2021 when the delegates gave approval to the Executive Council to sell the facility. Baileys Commercial conducted a tender process which resulted in the successful sale of the building and land at 11 Prosser St Porirua to well-known property owner Robt.Jones Holdings.



After 40 years of hosting dog events the last All Breeds show in the facility was hosted by the Wellington Ladies kennel Association. The last speciality show was hosted by Southern Cross Staffordshire Bull Terrier Society. Dog Training activities continued in the venue right up to handover date in December 2021.

Relocation of National Office

The National Office was relocated to new Porirua premises in September 2021. We at last have office facilities that our staff deserve with working heating and air-conditioning, meeting rooms and a large boardroom that all Dogs NZ committee's can use.

We have signed a 5 year lease for the Porirua office with the option to purchase the building which includes four tennant's. A proposal on the purchase from Management will be reviewed by the Capital Expenditure and Risk Audit & Finance Committees before any final recommendation to Executive Council.

The Dogs NZ Museum items and our Registry archive were placed in suitable long term storage in the Wellington Region. Show equipment is stored in two containers and we would like to thank Gary & Lyn Carlton for hosting the containers on their Ziminka Kennels property on the Kapiti Coast

I would like to thank Facility Manager Mark Nunn who did an outstanding job in managing the clean-up and handover. Remit 1 by Executive Council

Motion:

Remove Rule 14(f) and renumber Rules 14 (g) and 14 (h)

Rule 14 (f) RECOGNISED SHOWS

Dogs shall not be in a show for a period of more than two days, except with the prior approval of the Executive Council, but no dog is to be present at a show for more than three days.

Rule 14 (g) (f)

Rule 14 (h) (g)

Rationale:

With the move to hosting National Dog Show, NDOA and NZDAC over three – four days this rule is no longer relevant to the modern show world.



Presentations

It is anticipated that these presentations will commence after lunch which is scheduled for 12.20pm. Any Dogs NZ member is welcome to attend the Annual Conference of Delegates as an observer. The proceedings (including all presentations) will be lived streamed on our website.

Lower North Island Venue Working Group Presentation (Chair Lisa Slade & Committee Members)

The Lower North Island Venue Working Group has been tasked to investigate the options for developing a new home for dog sports in the lower North Island. The presentation will cover the facility options they are currently investigating as well as the process that needs to be followed before any future investment is approved by Executive Council.

Forsyth Barr Investment Fund Presentation (Grant Tatton & Mike Green)

Forsyth Barr Investment Advisors Grant Tatton and Mike Green manage the Dogs NZ Investment Fund and will deliver a presentation outlining their current view of the investment climate and their approach to the asset allocation of Dogs NZ Capital.

Dogs NZ Health Testing Strategy and Importance of LRL's (CH&W Committee)

The development of canine health testing protocols is critical to improving the health of Dogs NZ registered dogs and maintaining our social license to operate as pedigree dog breeders. The expansion of our Litter Registration Limitations (LRL) programme to incorporate our most popular and "at risk" breeds is a priority for Dogs NZ as we work to differentiate our breeders from "back yard puppy farmers."

Selling Pedigree Dogs (Keith Brown)

Keith Brown is a passionate breeder of pedigree dogs with over 40 years' experience. Enjoy an interesting and informative presentation on the role of breeders to promote pedigree dog ownership and the importance of registering all your puppies and ensuring the new owners of puppies receive their pedigree papers.

Term: **2020 - 2022**

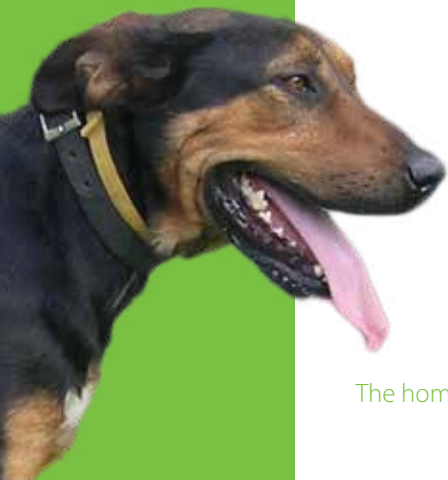

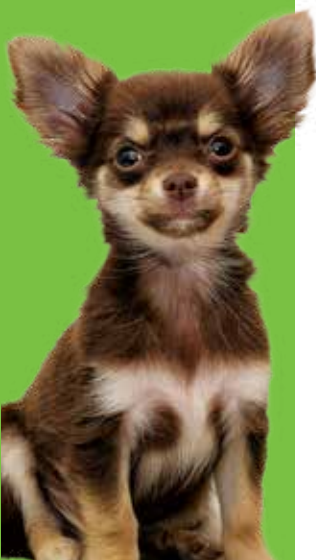

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New Zealand Kennel Club Incorporated **Entity Information**

The New Zealand Kennel Club was established in 1886. It exists primarily as an organisation of dog owners which gives it collective bargaining power and a single voice to Government, the general public and other interest groups on behalf of dog breeders, dog owners, Kennel Clubs and other associated societies in the canine world.

It maintains a database which traces the genealogy and pedigree of New Zealand Dogs as well as progression of sports and activities associated with Canines (Breed Clubs, Obedience, Agility, Working Trials, Canine Good Citizen™, New Zealand Young Kennel Club and others).

The New Zealand Kennel Club is an organisation that operates at two levels.

Affiliated Societies

From its inception in 1886, the New Zealand Kennel Club was an association of societies and still is today. There are 296 societies affiliated to, associated with and recognised by NZKC. All New Zealand Kennel Club member societies are required to have written constitutions.

As a member of the New Zealand Kennel Club a society is restricted to act only as permitted by the New Zealand Kennel Club Rules and Regulations and the club's status pursuant to those rules and regulations. It is restricted to do those things only permitted by its constitution and the laws of the country.

Individual Membership

Individual membership allows a member, among other things, to register a dog with NZKC, enter a dog in a show or competition, be a delegate to the Annual Conference, and hold executive office in any Affiliated or Associated Society.

Governance

NZKC holds an annual conference of delegates. This gathering, attended by delegates from throughout the country elects a governing council to run the affairs of the body. It gives policy direction for the following year, approves accounts and sets membership fees.

The Executive Council

The Executive Council meets six times a year to consider business. The day to day running of the Society is delegated to the administrative staff, headed by the Directory Secretary. Administration deals mainly with the finance, register, membership matters, the NZ Dog World and the website.

Funding

Funding is provided primarily from individual membership subscriptions, fees for registration of dogs, sponsorship and levies from club shows.

Independent Auditor's Report

To the Executive Council of New Zealand Kennel Club Incorporated

Opinion We have audited the financial information in the accompanying financial statements of New Zealand Kennel Club Incorporated (the 'Club'), which comprises the statement of financial position as at 31 March 2022, and the statement of financial performance, statement of movements in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and the statement of accounting policies and other explanatory information in notes 1 to 16.

In our opinion, the financial information in the financial statements presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Club as at 31 March 2022 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting – Accrual (Not-for-Profit) issued by the New Zealand Accounting Standards Board ('PBE SFR – A (NFP)').

Basis for opinion We conducted our audit of the statement of financial performance, statement of financial position, statement of cash flows, statement of accounting policies and notes to the financial information in the financial statements in accordance with International Standards on Auditing ('ISAs') and International Standards on Auditing (New Zealand) ('ISAs (NZ)'). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

We are independent of the Club in accordance with Professional and Ethical Standard 1 *International Code of Ethics for Assurance Practitioners (including International Independence Standards) (New Zealand)* issued by the New Zealand Auditing and Assurance Standards Board and the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' *International Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (including International Independence Standards)*, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements.

Other than in our capacity as auditor, we have no relationship with or interests in the Club, except that partners and employees of our firm deal with the Club on normal terms within the ordinary course of trading activities of the business of the Club.

Other information The Executive Council is responsible on behalf of the Club for the other information. The other information comprises the Club information on page 3, the statement of service performance on page 18 that accompanies the financial information included in the financial statements and the audit report.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

Our responsibility is to read the other information and consider whether it is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If so, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Executive Council's responsibilities for the Financial Statements

The Executive Council is responsible on behalf of the Club for:

- the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements on behalf of the Club in accordance with PBE SFR – A (NFP), and
- for such internal control as the Executive Council determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the Executive Council is responsible on behalf of the Club for assessing the Club's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Executive Council either intends to liquidate the Club or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial information in the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs and ISAs (NZ) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial Statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with ISAs and ISAs (NZ), we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial information in the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Club's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the Executive Council.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the use of the going concern basis of accounting by the Executive Council and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Club's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Club to cease to continue as a going concern.

We communicate with the Executive Council regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

Our audit has been undertaken so that we might state to the Executive Council those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the Executive Council as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Reporting Entity

The New Zealand Kennel Club Incorporated (the "Club") is a society incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908. These financial statements are for the group which comprises the Club and the New Zealand Kennel Club Museum Trust Incorporated (the "Museum Trust"), which the Club has control over.

General Accounting Policies

These financial statements are reported under PBE SFR (accruals for NFP) as expenditure is less than \$2 million per annum.

The Club has adopted PBE IPSAS 29 "Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement" to account for investments. Further details are provided in Note 12.

Measurement Base

The accounting principles recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of earnings and financial position on a historic cost basis are followed by the Club other than investments recorded at fair value. These financial statements are prepared under the assumption that the Club will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position have been applied:

(a) Goods and Services Tax ("GST")

These financial statements have been prepared on a GST exclusive basis, except for accounts receivable and accounts payable, which are reported on a GST inclusive basis.

(b) Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment is recorded at historical cost, less depreciation and impairment.

(c) Depreciation

Depreciation has been calculated on a straight line basis at the following rates:

Buildings	2.50%
Freehold Improvements	10.00%
New Freehold Improvements	5.00% to 10.00%
Computer Equipment and Software	25.00%
Tractor and Equipment	15.00%
Office Furniture, Equipment and Tools	10.00% to 20.00%

(d) Taxation

The Club is recognised as being a sporting body and as such is not liable for income tax under CW46 of the Income Tax Act 2007. The Club has a tax exemption certificate from Inland Revenue.

(e) Principles of Consolidation

(i) These financial statements are for the group which comprise the Club and the Museum Trust. The Museum Trust has a term deposit as shown on Note 4, the interest of which is immaterial to the results of the group. As the subsidiaries are either non-trading or are immaterial to the group, the results of the parent have not been shown separately. The balance date of both subsidiaries is 31 March.

(ii) The Statement of Financial Performance on page 6 eliminates all intra group transactions.

(f) Receivables

Debtors are stated at estimated realisable value.

(g) Income Recognition

Subscriptions and memberships are accounted for over the period of the membership with future income recorded as deferred revenue. Other income including Affiliation Fees are accounted for on an accruals basis. Those Affiliation Fees received that are related to the next financial year are recorded as receipts in advance. Revenue from gate sales and fund raising activities is recognised as earned, as their receipt cannot be anticipated. There is no income outstanding at year end that was received on a use or return basis.

(h) Donations

Donations and other gratuities are recognised as revenue at the point when receipt is formally and officially acknowledged by the Club.

(i) Changes in Accounting Policies

There were no changes in accounting policies during the financial year (2021:nil)

(j) Operating Leases

Leases that do not transfer substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership of an asset to the entity are classified as operating leases. Lease payments under an operating lease are recognised as an expense on a straight line basis over the term of the lease in the Statement of Financial Performance.

(k) Sponsorship

The New Zealand Kennel Club 3 year sponsorship agreement with Nestle Purina NZ provides a cash contribution to our operations, pet food prizes for Club competitions and marketing services to various joint projects.

(l) Managed fund investment

The Club records Managed fund investments at fair value on the balance sheet with changes in fair value recorded through the Statement of Financial Performance.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants.

2021/22 Financial Year Represented a Land Mark Year.

Dogs NZ are delighted to report operating surpluses before depreciation of \$135k and after depreciation of \$54k.

The operating surplus results from solid, stable membership, registry and Gazette revenue and a strong focus on cost management. Dogs NZ have managed to weather the “COVID years” in good financial shape, posting healthy surpluses for the past two financial years. It is reassuring the organization can rely on these sound core activities in times of adversity.

ACOD 2021 gave approval to sell the 11 Prosser Street Property. After a successful tender sale process the Prosser Street facility was sold. In addition to the operating surpluses mentioned, Dogs NZ are delighted to report a profit on sale of \$5.990m. A detailed breakdown of this transaction appears in Note 11 of the notes to the Financial Statements.

The sale of Prosser Street has removed a cost burden to the organization and provided a cash rich balance sheet to enable Dogs NZ to create additional revenue streams from investment, progress its strategic objectives and fund any future facility investments we decide to make.

Dogs NZ established a Lower North Island Venue Working Group which has been actively investigating future facility investments. A well-considered process is in place and Dogs NZ wish to emphasize the importance of reaching a sound thoroughly investigated decision. It is important we ensure any future facility investment will not become a burden on our operational cost structure and we will be able to meet the ongoing required maintenance investment.

The 2022/23 Budget reflects a cautious approach to a “post COVID” normal as we return to a full schedule of national shows and other event activities. The current financial year will be challenging as we have entered a period of high inflation and are already facing significant unbudgeted cost increases from suppliers. The market turmoil will impact investment income and we have already witnessed a slowdown in our dog registration income. The budget, which was prepared during the first two months of 2022, reflects a small operational surplus before depreciation. Dogs NZ will be using two critical tools to help navigate our way through the challenging period ahead, these being annual reviews of all service fees and effective monitoring of expenses.

At last year’s ACOD the new 10 year Strategy was launched which provides a road map for the future development of Dogs NZ. The 2022/23 budget and Business Plan embraces 19 projects under our 5 key Strategic Goals.

We have invested in a full time Canine Health & Welfare Officer to drive the number of breeds adopting our LRL Health Testing standards. We are also investing in developing better online membership services and in partnership with our sponsor Purina Pro Plan, will be rolling out a number of programs to support clubs, new members and breeders. Dog Training activities are another area where we have increased investment to support Train the Trainers’ programs and dog training conferences and seminars.

A number of these projects will take time to show their full potential but it is important that we continue to invest in our future while continuing to act in a financially prudent manner.

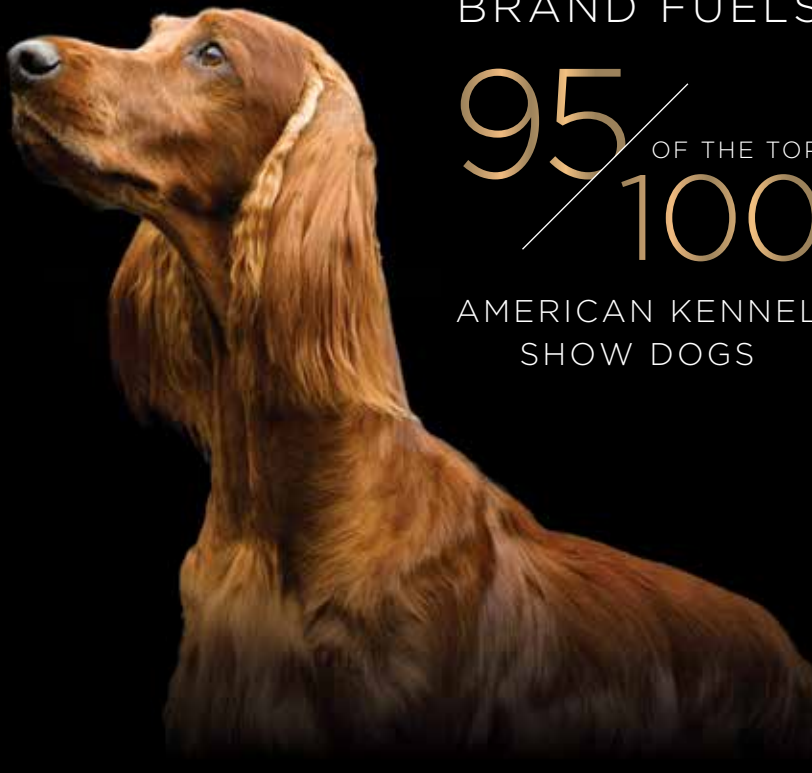
